## Our Story & Purpose

Founded in 1961 by the Loveland Council of Churches, House of Neighborly Service was created to ensure neighbors facing crisis could access help and essential resources in one place. As HNS approaches its 65th anniversary, that purpose remains unchanged—providing timely assistance that stabilizes households and helps prevent further crisis.

Over the decades, HNS has evolved alongside the community it serves. Programs have expanded, partnerships have strengthened, and services have adapted to meet increasing demand driven by economic uncertainty, rising costs, and changing family needs. In 1989, services expanded to Berthoud, increasing access for households across our service area.

Today, HNS focuses on meeting immediate needs while helping individuals and families move toward stability. Through practical assistance and coordinated support, HNS helps neighbors remain housed, meet basic needs, and access the resources necessary to build a more secure future.

Collaboration is central to this work. In 2014, HNS established the Loveland Life Center, a shared space where nonprofit partners work together to reduce barriers, expand access to care, and deliver more effective, wraparound support for the community. A similar collaborative Life Center model is also offered in Berthoud through a hosted site, allowing HNS and partners to bring coordinated services directly to the community.

Together, we are creating a kinder, more neighborly community through help, resources, and hope.

# Letter from the Executive Director

As we reflect on 2025, we do so with deep gratitude for the resilience, compassion, and faithfulness that define House of Neighborly Service, and for the donors whose generosity makes this work possible. For more than six decades, our mission has remained steady: assisting neighbors facing low-income or situational crisis with dignity, practical support, and hope.

This past year brought unexpected shifts, and donor support played a critical role in helping HNS respond with stability and care. We navigated the loss of critical funding connected to Family Promise while transitioning into the HNS Family Day Center. That transition sharpened our focus on prevention and stabilization: helping families remain housed by addressing immediate needs such as food, clothing, utilities, and essential resources. Because of your generosity, HNS continued meeting these needs without interruption.

In Berthoud, plans for a Life Center shifted, but our commitment to the community—and the trust placed in us by donors—did not. While we are not yet building, 2026 will bring meaningful investment through new climate-controlled, food-grade storage that allows us to serve more efficiently and build long-term capacity.

We also expanded our diaper program in 2025, distributing thousands of diapers each month. This vital support provides dignity, stability, and financial relief to families, helping parents redirect limited resources toward essentials like rent, utilities, and food.

As we enter 2026, we do so with clarity, gratitude, and confidence because of a community of donors who believe in meeting people with dignity and compassion. Thank you for being a caring neighbor and for making this work possible, now and into the future, together.

# Year in Review at a Glance

Thanks to your generous support, House of Neighborly Service continued to assist and advocate for individuals and families facing poverty or situational crisis throughout our communities. In 2025, the need for help increased—and because of you, our response increased as well.

## 76,679 Services Provided in 2025


*An increase from 66,540 services in 2024—reflecting both rising community need and the compassionate response of our caring neighbors.*

Because of your partnership, House of Neighborly Service was able to:

- **Stabilize 3,029 households, including 1,975 children**, through essential, dignity-centered support provided at our Loveland and Berthoud locations.
- **Distribute 9,700 food baskets**, ensuring access to nourishment for individuals and families facing food insecurity.
- **Provide clothing items to 4,233 individuals**, helping neighbors meet basic needs with warmth, dignity, and respect.

Each number represents more than a service—it reflects a moment of care, a step toward stability, and renewed hope for the future.

### RESPONDING TO GROWING NEED TOGETHER

As the graph shows, the need for support has continued to grow from 2021 through 2025. Each data point represents real people facing real challenges—and a community that chose to respond. Together, we ensured neighbors were not alone during times of hardship and uncertainty.

# House of Neighborly Service Programs

## FOOD ASSISTANCE

For many individuals and families, the HNS food pantry is the first source of relief in times of crisis. Food baskets are structured to support household stability by providing up to seven days of nutritious meals, with dietary needs accommodated whenever possible. For those without kitchen access, ready-to-eat food baskets are available. In addition, hygiene items and pet food are included as needed and when available, ensuring that no member of the household—human or pet—goes without care.

## HOUSEHOLD STABILIZATION

HNS works alongside utility providers, pharmacies, and gas stations to offer emergency assistance that stabilizes households in crisis. This includes preventing utility shut-offs, ensuring access to critical prescriptions, and providing transportation support through fuel assistance and bus passes. By addressing these urgent needs, HNS helps individuals and families regain stability and avoid deeper financial hardship.

## CLOTHING PROGRAM

HNS ensures that qualifying clients have access to free clothing, shoes, and small household essentials year-round. The program is sustained through generous community donations, meaning the availability of items varies based on support. Every donation and contribution helps to bring dignity and warmth to those in need.

## FAMILY NAVIGATORS

*(January-July only due to loss of funding)*

To prevent at-risk families from entering the child welfare system, Family Navigators provide personalized support to address crises and remove barriers to stability. Through guidance, advocacy, and access to resources, families receive the help they need to function optimally and move forward with confidence.

## FAMILY PROMISE OF LARIMER COUNTY

*(Transitioning to the HNS Family Day Center in 2026)*

In 2025, Family Promise of Larimer County supported families with children experiencing situational homelessness by providing pathways toward stability and self-sufficiency. Families engaged in services through a combination of short-term, hotel-based shelter, bridge housing, and day-center support, tailored to their needs and circumstances. By addressing barriers related to housing, employment, and financial stability, Family Promise helped families take meaningful steps toward long-term independence.

*Beginning in January 2026, Family Promise services transitioned to the HNS Family Day Center, reflecting a strategic shift toward prevention-focused, daytime stabilization services for families facing housing insecurity.*

## When Work Slows Down, Help Steps In

“The food at House of Neighborly Service truly makes a difference—especially during the winter months when my husband’s work slows down. We apply for SNAP, but it doesn’t always stretch far enough during those slower periods. I’m home with our two toddlers, and we’re expecting our third child. Without the food support we receive from HNS, I honestly don’t know how we would make it.

Last year, everything changed when my husband unexpectedly lost his job. We were overwhelmed and unsure of what to do next. Through the Parents as Teachers program, we were encouraged to visit HNS for food support. From the moment we walked in, the process was easy, and **the staff made us feel comfortable—not judged. They were simply there to help.**

Today, my husband is working again, but we still rely on HNS to supplement our groceries during tight months. When we fell behind on rent after his job loss, HNS also connected us to resources we didn’t even know existed—helping us stay in our home. This support has made a real difference for our family. Thank you for being there when we needed it most.”

## GUIDING CONNECTIONS

Guiding Connections serves Loveland's adult homeless population by providing essential support and pathways toward stability. In partnership with 7 churches and Loveland SafeLot Parking, we provide Resource Navigation to help individuals and families through the difficulties of being unhoused with the goal of transitioning guests to more permanent housing.

## PARENTS AS TEACHERS (PAT)

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is evidence-based education and a home-visiting program designed to strengthen families with children from birth to age five, as well as expectant parents. Through personalized guidance, parents gain a deeper understanding of child development, receive practical parenting strategies, and build confidence in creating a strong foundation for their child's future.

## WRAP-AROUND SERVICES

HNS goes beyond meeting immediate needs by offering wrap-around services that strengthen households, reduce financial strain, and foster long-term stability.

- Diapers & Wipes Program (launched in 2025), providing essential hygiene supplies to families with infants and toddlers—helping reduce a significant household expense
- Birthday Closet and Holiday Program, bringing joy and dignity to children and families on meaningful occasions
- Scholarship screenings for City of Loveland Chilson Recreation Center and Town of Berthoud Parks & Recreation programs, supporting access for youth and seniors
- Vision care referrals through community partners such as the Lions Club
- Hundreds of referrals to trusted partner agencies offering specialized services and long-term support

Through these wrap-around services, HNS helps build a stronger, more connected community where every individual has the opportunity to thrive.



# Financial Overview

As we completed 2025, House of Neighborly Service continued to respond to increasing community needs, particularly within our food pantry, while maintaining responsible financial stewardship. Support from our donors, partners, and volunteers ensured that essential services remained available to families and individuals facing hardship. Alongside this support, earned revenue increased by 10% in 2024 and 14% in 2025, strengthening our ability to sustain services and respond to growing need. We move forward grounded in our mission and strengthened by the generosity that makes this work possible.

## Fiscal Year July to June: Income and Expenses 2023 – 2025



*\*In 2025, expenses exceeded revenue as HNS responded to increased community need and invested in stabilizing essential services. Contributing factors included a decline in individual giving, the absence of a one-time prior-year grant, increased food and utility costs, one-time professional fees related to the Berthoud project, and necessary investments to bring transitional housing into compliance.*

## The HNS Team

HNS staff and volunteers are the foundation of our work. Their dedication and compassion ensure the effective delivery of stabilizing and preventative services for individuals and families facing hardship.





# The Life Centers: A Collaborative Approach to Community Care

At House of Neighborly Service, collaboration is central to how we serve our neighbors. By bringing nonprofits, ministries, and community organizations together, the Life Centers strengthen families, expand access to care, and support long-term stability across our communities.

The Life Centers are designed to reduce barriers that often prevent access to essential services. By co-locating nonprofit partners and welcoming additional community organizations into shared space, the Life Centers function as centralized hubs where people can connect with multiple resources in one place. This collaborative model enables more effective, wraparound support—meeting needs holistically and efficiently.

## The Loveland Life Center: A Decade of Collaboration

House of Neighborly Service has surpassed a decade of collaborative service through the Loveland Life Center—a hub where 17 nonprofit tenant partners work to serve both locally and globally. In addition, the Life Center regularly hosts more than 35 mobile partners and community organizations that provide classes, workshops, and meetings throughout the year.

Together, these partnerships expand access to education and resource-building opportunities focused on health, financial literacy, leadership development, and connection to essential community resources. To sustain this collaborative model for the long term, House of Neighborly Service launched Inspiring Hope, a debt-reduction campaign focused on strengthening the financial foundation of the Loveland Life Center—preserving this vital space for years to come.

Berthoud remains essential to our future, and we are committed to moving forward together with clarity, care, and confidence.

# Treasure Exchange: Thrift with a Purpose


